[24/04/2016 15:44:22] Weekend Testing Europe: Things like 'reserving a table at the popular restaurant on a Friday night', are good rules of thumb. It might not be busy but better to play it safe.

user's perspective

[24/04/2016 15:58:55] pablosapitan (Guest): and the very useful for me is to experiment things

[24/04/2016 15:59:03] pablosapitan (Guest): i try to break the whole application

[24/04/2016 16:00:07] Marine Serré: I find it also helpful because it changes my focus. I tend to look at bugs at a certain way. For example, consistency of layout is something I don't pay attention to.

[24/04/2016 16:00:50] Marine Serré: so by using this heuristics, I train myself to look at my system with multiple hats

[24/04/2016 16:14:54] Weekend Testing Europe: Heuristics help us to look in the right places. The oracles help us spot problems when we get there

[24/04/2016 16:15:13] Weekend Testing Europe: But I think we are always using oracles
[24/04/2016 16:15:16] Dwayne Green: Oracles can be wrong too - similar to Heuristics
