[15:42:34] Weekend Testing Europe: So, to keep with the sporting theme, we're going to be taking a look at the official Euro 2016 website. The URL is <http://www.uefa.com/uefaeuro/>

[15:43:39] Weekend Testing Europe: This first exercise is a site recon. In other words, we are going to make ourselves familiar with the site, to make our next exercise easier.

2. What are the major features of the site?

3. What are the minor (less important) features of the site?

4. Can you think of some different audiences for this site? (Obviously football fans, but who else?)

5. What are the biggest risks for this site? (What would be really bad if it went wrong?)

6. What other sites/services would be the competitors for this site?

[15:45:25] Weekend Testing Europe: In 30 minutes time, we will gather here to discuss the answers to those questions. Now it's time to explore the site and try to answer the questions. You can make notes in any format you like.

[15:55:47] Weekend Testing Europe: Yes, in the real-world we would certainly want to see metrics for this. In the case of the UEFA Euro 2016 site, in the real-world we might have access to usage stats for the Euro 2012 site, or from last season's Champions League pages.

[15:56:20] Weekend Testing Europe: The important thing is to gain clarity in your mission, so that you don't make false assumptions

- [16:23:23] Christian Kram: for me the main purpose is to provide a central information hub for everything related to the championship
- [16:23:25] Dolores Zurdo: Provide real-time information about football and now more about europe champion league
- [16:24:45] Weekend Testing Europe: Yes, all of the answers so far seem to have it nailed-on. It's not a trick question, but sometimes it can give clarity to ask the question. Particularly when talking about what the features are - if you have to list-out the features then sometimes you realise there's a feature that's under-tested, for instance.
- [16:25:43] Daniel Billing: Purpose is always pretty subjective...we might use it for othe reasons for which it is intended
- [16:26:13] Daniel Billing: UEFA are a business, like any other
- [16:26:18] Weekend Testing Europe: In both Dan's and Christian's mind-maps, I see the beginnings of a Product Coverage Outline, which is a slightly more formalised document outlining the features of a site. This can be a very useful document for forming the basis of a test plan. You can read an example of a Product Coverage Outline in this blog post: <http://prairietester.blogspot.co.uk/2013/09/monday-product-coverage-outlines.html>

- [16:26:33] Daniel Billing: their business is European football and revenue from that
- [16:27:22] Weekend Testing Europe: Yes Dan, which takes us on nicely to Q4 - the audience of the site. As well as football fans, sponsors are clearly a big part of their audience
- [16:27:54] Daniel Billing: yes...it's part of why i use advertising free news vendors to get my information...
- [16:27:59] Weekend Testing Europe: It's interesting to compare how the site looks, both with and without Adblock. I use Adblock in my day-to-day usage, and was very surprised by how much extra appeared when I was not blocking ads!

- [16:29:05] Christian Kram: yeah, noticed that as well when cross-checked desktop pc and tablet appearance
- [16:29:29] Weekend Testing Europe: There's some curious placement of sponsor logos in the header. There are two logos in the top-right of every page, but they change when refreshing the page. Part of me is curious to reload the page 1000 times, measure how many times each sponsor appears, and decide whether they have equal weightings! :D
- [16:29:54] Weekend Testing Europe: That's just my compulsive side. Of course if we worked for UEFA then they could tell us whether there were weightings, and then we could test whether these were accurate.
- [16:30:13] Weekend Testing Europe: Let's finish by talking about risks. What's the worst that could happen for this site?
- [16:31:07] Daniel Billing: some will have contributed more than others...Orange for tech

[16:31:11] Daniel Billing: for example

[16:31:11] Adina Sit: It could be hacked, some pages wouldn't be able to load at all, the information could not be updated in time or correctly

[16:31:16] Christian Kram: since it is the official page, being down (for whatever reason) would be the worst scenario. especially around game times

[16:31:25] Daniel Billing: Defacement via SQLInjection and XSS is common

[16:31:39] Dolores Zurdo: 1. During a match so many people want to see the result that the website is not working.

[16:31:42] Daniel Billing: you could replace all the advertising images with other stuff

[16:32:13] Daniel Billing: or during ticket sales, the site was brought down by large traffic volumes

[16:32:17] Daniel Billing: and load

[16:33:00] Dolores Zurdo: Maybe someone want to buy tickets and is not possible

[16:33:10] Christian Kram: and as always: wrong information would be a blow for credibility (forgetting about an injury time goal or something like that).

[16:33:20] Weekend Testing Europe: Yes, and these would all have a knock-on impact for company reputation. Therefore we can guess that they probably focused their testing efforts in these areas before launch.

[16:33:55] Weekend Testing Europe: Certainly, I've been using the site during the tournament (and during matches) and their live coverage tends to be up-to-date. I don't think they've had any downtime during matches; was there downtime when tickets went on sale? That wouldn't surprise me.

[16:33:56] Daniel Billing: uptime and availability are crucial, ask Amy, when Adele released her album and concert tickets

[16:34:03] Daniel Billing: on Songkick

[16:34:17] Weekend Testing Europe: We had a funny incident at work this week

[16:34:31] Daniel Billing: oh?

[16:34:35] Weekend Testing Europe: We have lots of live monitoring on our website so that we can tell if there is an unprecedented drop in traffic (which might highlight server problems)

[16:34:43] Daniel Billing: the meerkat comparison engine went down?

[16:34:58] Weekend Testing Europe: At 2pm on Thursday, the England v Wales match began, so everyone stopped using our site - and all our alarms went off :D

[16:35:38] Daniel Billing: when is your traffic at its most?

[16:35:50] Daniel Billing: because people are renewing insurance all the time?

[16:36:06] Weekend Testing Europe: It differs from product to product. A surprising number of people like to renew their insurance on a Monday morning. Otherwise, evenings and weekends are when people have the most free time

[16:36:31] Weekend Testing Europe: But, let's get back to Euro 2016 - time for the second part of today's exercise

[16:37:43] Weekend Testing Europe: Please don't attempt any security or performance testing as we haven't asked permission for this and we don't want to potentially disrupt a live site.

[16:38:23] Weekend Testing Europe: Otherwise, it's a free-for-all. Maybe you want to try testing a particular browser or device. Just test whatever features interest you - I'm not asking you to test what you think the most important thing would be.

[16:38:59] Weekend Testing Europe: I don't know if you agree with me, but I'm not expecting you to find that many bugs. And this is where the challenge comes in: I'm interested in how you'll describe what you tested, if you didn't find many bugs.

[17:12:56] Adina Sit: I tested the site as a whole using Google Chrome on Android 6.0. Many websites have problems while on mobile and I thought this would get many inconsistencies.

[17:13:03] Daniel Billing: in order to submit you need to be a registered user

[17:13:23] Daniel Billing: once submitted, you cannot edit your selections

[17:14:57] Weekend Testing Europe: Actually, I found it's possible to submit without being a registered user. There is a tiny "Skip" button in the bottom-right corner. Obviously, they would prefer you to register, so they hide the link out of the way... another example of a 'Dark Pattern' (as we talked about in a session at the end of last year)

[17:15:35] Weekend Testing Europe: Dolores, can you describe the bugs that you found? I found a video bug too; I can provide replication steps, but I'm struggling to work out why it happens.

[17:16:50] Weekend Testing Europe: Oh, well done Adina! Those definitely sound like genuine mobile bugs, and there is reasonable information there to allow you (or someone else) to replicate them

[17:18:38] Adina Sit: Thank you, I'll look into the video problem, as well :)

[17:18:48] Dolores Zurdo: i mean for my bug number 3 when the video with low quality and full screnn then the scren change alone as the picture...

[17:19:45] Weekend Testing Europe: I found that when I was watching a video, if I loaded another video from the sidebar, it would successfully load that video (and change the URL). However, if I then reloaded the URL, it would say "page not found". Example:

1. Go to <http://www.uefa.com/uefaeuro/video/highlights/videoid=2280997.html>

2. In the filter, select 'Filter by team > France'

3. In the video sidebar, select France v Armenia - the URL changes to

<http://www.uefa.com/uefaeuro/video/highlights/videoid=2291600.html> and the page loads correctly

4. Refresh the page - the URL is still as previous step, but now it says "Page not found"

[17:20:26] Weekend Testing Europe: For the main part of my testing, I decided to run a spidering tool against the website to look for any 'page not found' errors. I used a desktop tool called LinkChecker:

[17:21:28] Daniel Billing: Pick A Team

You can select a team you would prefer to be playing in the next match

To submit you need to register as a UEFA.com user

If you select a team, submit and then register, your team selections are retained, but you cannot go back and amend them

Even if I log out, it has remembered my team selection

[17:21:37] Weekend Testing Europe: It identified the issue above, and one other potentially minor issue - many pages reported that the URL ".mosaic-hidden-mobile" could not be found. This sounds like something related to mobile CSS, it may just be redundant code that's not needed any more (or it may be linked to Adina's mobile bug reports)
